

GUERNSEY'S FIRST LIBERATION DAY

As dawn broke on Wednesday 9 May 1945, peace returned to Guernsey.

Off the coast of Guernsey lay two British destroyers, HMS Bulldog and HMS Beagle; they brought to an end five long years of German occupation of the Channel Islands. Soon after their arrival, on that memorable morning, a German armed trawler put out from St Peter Port. Aboard her were Major General O Heine, military adviser to Vice-Admiral F Hoffmeier, the German Commander-in-Chief, together with Kapt Lieutenant A Zimmermann who, rather earlier, had paid a preliminary visit to the Bulldog, aboard which was Brigadier A E Snow, in command of 'Operation Nest Egg', code name for the Liberation of these Islands. It was on board that ship that the German surrender of Guernsey took place.

Soon afterwards, an advance party of twenty two British artillerymen, under the command of Lieutenant Colonel E D Stoneman, came ashore on two small Guernsey craft, each of which wore the White Ensign. In charge of one was a Guernseyman, Lieutenant R E Ferbrache RNVR, and one of the soldiers in the party was Sergeant H J Hamon, another islander. The British troops received a tremendous welcome as they landed at the White Rock, where they were officially greeted by Advocate J E L Martel (HM Procureur) and Police Inspector A Lamy.

Unofficially, they were hailed with exultation by a multitude of cheering islanders, some weeping for joy. Later in the day 200 more troops arrived and marched off the White Rock led by the band of the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry which, before the war, had once formed our garrison. Many islanders came in from the country parishes in horse-drawn carts, on bicycles and on foot. Our liberators were overwhelmed at their reception. They gave away chocolate, sweets and cigarettes, receiving in return souvenir German money.

The Bailiff sent this message to King George VI: 'After nearly five years of German Occupation, the people of your Bailiwick of Guernsey respectfully beg Your Majesty to accept their humble duty and unshaken loyalty.' The King, in his reply, stated that our message had given him great pleasure and satisfaction. The Prime Minister, Winston Churchill, sent this telegram to the Bailiff: 'You should have heard the House of Commons cheer at the news of your Liberation.' The Bailiff replied: 'We are all deeply touched by, and grateful for your telegram conveying the enthusiasm of the House of Commons at our deliverance.'

Before the service, organ music will be played.

Please stand for the arrival of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, Lieutenant General Richard Cripwell CB CBE, and Mrs Cripwell, the Bailiff of Guernsey, Mr Richard McMahon, and the President of the Policy & Resources Committee, Deputy Peter Ferbrache, who will be escorted to their places.

When the parade is ready to enter the church, all stand. The processional hymn is sung; the standards are brought forward.

All people that on earth do dwell, sing to the Lord with cheerful voice; him serve with fear, his praise forth tell, come ye before him, and rejoice.

The Lord, ye know, is God indeed; without our aid he did us make; we are his folk, he doth us feed, and for his sheep he doth us take.

O enter then his gates with praise, approach with joy his courts unto; praise, laud, and bless his name always, for it is seemly so to do.

For why? the Lord our God is good; his mercy is for ever sure; his truth at all times firmly stood, and shall from age to age endure.

To Father, Son and Holy Ghost, the God whom heaven and earth adore, from men and from the angel-host be praise and glory evermore.

The Welcome

The congregation sits. The Dean of Guernsey, the Very Reverend Tim Barker, says

It is a privilege to welcome you to this service: those in the Town Church, as well as those who are joining this service, whether in Guernsey or beyond the shores of this island, through other media.

Today is a celebration of the Liberation of Guernsey on Wednesday 9 May 1945. We recall that remarkable and glorious day when British troops came ashore in St Peter Port, ending the five long years of occupation of Guernsey by German troops, and giving hope of ending of the privations of the people of Guernsey, and of the return to the Island of those who spent the years of occupation in the United Kingdom, in Biberach, in Laufen or elsewhere.

Today is a day of thanksgiving for our continuing freedom and selfdetermination as a Crown Dependency.

But it is also a day of memories.

We remember the temporary exile of so many Guernsey people in the United Kingdom during the occupation of Guernsey and Alderney, and give thanks for those who welcomed and cared for them.

We remember the deportation of large numbers of local residents, including many of non-Guernsey origin, who had faced uncertain and dangerous times as prisoners in Germany, including the three Jewish women who were sent to Laval from where they were transported with others to Auschwitz Birkenau. We give thanks for those men and women who have forged links of reconciliation between former enemies. We celebrate the life springing from our years of reconciliation and our continuing and deepening friendship with the people of Biberach.

We remember those brought to these islands to work for the occupying forces, often in harsh and inhumane conditions.

For many people, today is a day for recalling painful and vivid memories of loss and separation, of hardship and deprivation, of fear and anxiety.

We know only too well that life and peace are both precious and fragile; and that too many people in our world do not know and enjoy the peace, security and prosperity in which we are privileged to live. We think particularly today about the people of Ukraine and Sudan, and those who live in other places which are blighted by war and violence.

And so, conscious of the sins of humanity and our own sins and failings, we turn to God.

The Prayers of Penitence

The Reverend Penny Graysmith, priest in charge of St Peter Port, says

Let us confess to God the sins and shortcomings of the world; its pride, its selfishness, its greed; its evil distortions and hatreds.

Let us confess our share in what is wrong, and our failure to seek and establish that peace which God wills for all his people. Lord Jesus, you wept over the sins of your city. On this Bailiwick of Guernsey: Lord, have mercy.
